### **Tusculum Church of Christ Medical Team**

Again this year the Tusculum Church of Christ from Nashville, TN came to Santa Rosa de Copán in order to conduct a medical clinic. Last year for the first time, this group helped Mission UpReach open doors to the Gospel in Lucerna, Ocotepeque. They returned again this year and served 904 people with medical as well as vision checkups.

The people were so grateful, and their needs were evidenced by the large quantity of medications that were prescribed and dispersed (free of charge) to the attendees. One family said, "For us, this kind of help is a huge blessing. Many times when we have gotten sick we can't buy medicine, and now we are so happy and thankful that we have received it!"

This team also visited an eldercare facility in town on Monday afternoon where they served homemade chicken soup and sang to the residents. Joy was evident on their faces, and it was a fulfilling experience for the team. This year the Tusculum team brought four participants from Oklahoma City, OK as well as two from West Virginia. As teams like Tusculum invite people from other churches, those individuals go back to their home churches and share what God is doing. From that,



new teams are developed, which has resulted in a growing number of visiting teams to western Honduras each year.

We appreciate the vision and service of the Tusculum church and look forward to many more years of working together to open doors to the Gospel.

# **Corquin church celebrates three years**



This church plant has now planted a new church further up into the mountains in a community by the name of Portrerillos. The 3-year anniversary celebration was attended by 110 people. Obviously, God is at work in Corquín and is using the excellent service and leadership of Mike and Kris Bridges.

Caleb not only served the Mission well, but he also developed many deep relationships and served in leadership at the local church. We believe this is a good and timely move for Caleb and for the advancement of our coffee sales in the U.S., but his absence is felt allaround, and he will be greatly missed.



### DESEO, ESPERO kick off 2020 school year

DESEO began working in schools again this past month, just after the new school year began on February 3rd. This will be the 10th consecutive



year of serving the community with this program! They will be serving in eight elementary schools and two kindergartens for a total outreach of 1365 children. As many already know, this team of energetic young adults leads the collective school body of each school in a time of singing, prayer, and a skit of a Bible story followed by a values lesson in each classroom.

DESEO also includes afternoon basketball leagues and tutoring. In addition, the DESEO team helps conduct our annual Bible Camp for children from this program and the community. We believe, and have seen real evidence, that our investment in these children has great potential for effecting cultural changes as well as changing the lives of the individuals. Several teams visit each year and take advantage of the open doors in these schools to bring VBS style Bible lessons to these children.

Our child sponsorship program takes our involvement and the impact to a whole new level by providing a supportive personal relationship between a child and their U.S. sponsor. For less than one fast food meal for your family, you can make a life-long impact on a child's life and help us continue to serve the children of western Honduras.

Just as the Honduran school year kicks off in February, so does our deaf school for adults. This year we have 18 fulltime students enrolled, and for the first time we have a group of 6th graders who will complete their elementary school requirements. We also added a new full-time teacher for a total of two licensed teachers and two interpreters. A new and exciting development is that Abbie Wilson is offering sign language classes to the local church, mission employees, family members of deaf students, and the general public.

It was our hope that more family members of our deaf students would attend. Very few of them know sign language, which seriously hinders their ability to communicate with their deaf family member. Sadly, not many have chosen to participate. However, the turn out from others has been overwhelming with a total of 70 people participating weekly in sign language classes. Abbie does a great job with the classes and even involves the deaf students in the teaching. Please be in prayer about this new school year and the continual outreach to the deaf community.





### A note from Donna



This month has been very busy for us here in Honduras. Finding balance in the midst of the hectic times is a bit challenging. The beautiful thing about the life we lead here is that

almost all of what we do has a Kingdom impact.

Sometimes in my human weakness and fatigue, I function like what I do is common earthly work, but in reality, it is eternal and lasting. Just recently, while hosting some young adults in our home, I had one of those moments where I looked around at those young adults and wondered where they might be if we had never come to Honduras. Would they even know the Lord? What kinds of lives would they be leading? It is far more complex than just Phil and I coming to Honduras because that was just the beginning of what God has done.

It truly does take a village, and God has put together an incredible team and amazing resources to provide opportunities for individuals to grow in their relationship with Him. This has lead to better choices, better marriages, better children, and a better future for Honduras. Phil and I pray daily that what we are building with God's help will continue to have an impact long after we are gone and no one even remembers our names. Our goal is not to be remembered; it is to impact lives for eternity. 2020 is a building year, a year in which we need your support more than ever and your prayers are invaluable.

We have a lot of hurdles this year and our need for raising funds is the greatest it has been. 2021 looks very promising as our agri-businesses begin to produce income, but the foundation is still under construction.
