## **MUR Employee Spotlight**

**Kerlin Ramirez** is 24 and has spent most of his life in Santa Rosa de Copán. Being raised by a single mother wasn't always easy for Kerlin and his siblings. During the coffee harvest each year, Kerlin, along with his mother and younger siblings, spent weeks picking coffee to have money for the rest of the year. Kerlin first came to know Mission UpReach and the church as a curious young teen who was more interested in the cute girls in the youth group than he was in finding a relationship with God. Kerlin was a student in one of our first basketball leagues. Our DESEO team leadership (at the time) decided to identify natural leaders among the young teens in our league to help with younger players. Kerlin was selected and invited to serve as an assistant coach. He recalls one coffee season when he was invited to participate in a one-week intensive basketball training that resulted in conflict with his mother, who wasn't in agreement that he would "play" instead of work. He convinced her that his participation might lead to an opportunity. He was correct about that, and soon after he was offered an opportunity to "try out" for the DESEO team.

Kerlin's spiritual journey consisted of attending youth group occasionally, attending youth retreats as often as he could, and attending church less frequently. Once offered a position on the DESEO team, Kerlin began attending church regularly because it was a requirement, but fortunately the discipline led him to a transformation process that continues today.

Kerlin now serves as the team leader for our DESEO program. He



is attending college and majoring in Systems Engineering. He is a true leader with a great vision for the future. Kerlin says, "I can't imagine where my life would be if not for the persistent pursuit of the leaders of DESEO. Now I am the team leader of the same program that changed my life and I know that only God could make that possible."

# New challenges for DESEO and ESPERO due to school closures

While COVID cases and deaths are dropping in the U.S., they are on the rise here in Honduras. Our hospitals have been at the point of collapsing. Most of the public schools were not fully in person, but rather they had one grade attend daily so that they could get some limited instruction as well as their homework assignments. The government decided to close schools for a 2-week period and have now extended it for another 60 days. This includes our deaf school for adults. We are in the process of presenting our case before the school board for special permission with the promise of limiting attendance and respecting spacing





and mask wearing. We are praying for approval as online instruction is very challenging and ineffective for deaf individuals. Please be in prayer about that.

Our DESEO team has been visiting schools on the days the students were attending in the mornings and then offering tutoring in limited numbers in the afternoons. In response to this new shutdown, we have responded by choosing to go from house to house to offer one on one tutoring, or in some cases in small groups, outdoors and respecting spacing. We were not certain how parents might react due to everyone being so fearful about the spread of

COVID. To our delight, almost all the families we have visited are overwhelmed with gratitude. One father even offered to build a roof over his porch to make it easier for our team. We see this as an open door for evangelism as we become more personally connected with families in the community by being in their homes and meeting one of their greatest needs by helping to educate their children. Our video program continues, and now we can see clearly that videos are the key to continuing to teach the Bible and important values to as many children as possible that will impact their lives now and in the future.



#### A note from Donna

Last evening, on our way home from a nearby city, we encountered a parade of vehicles, including 6 freezer trucks, with flashing lights and honking horns. We discovered it was the arrival of vaccines from the President of El Salvador to specific Honduran municipalities.

It is unclear to us why the President of El Salvador is extending such generosity, but it makes us sad that Honduras' own President has done very little to bring vaccines into the country. The government of Honduras is offering to sell vaccines to companies and organizations, turning it into a profit center for the government. And of course, very few people really trust that the vaccines will ever arrive, and if they do, are they real and safe? It is very sad to witness the lack of trust the people of Honduras have for their government, but it is very easy to understand.

Whether you are choosing to get vaccinated or not, it does seem like a viable solution for the ongoing shutdowns, collapsing hospitals, and struggling economy for Hondurans. Hondurans don't have the choice of collecting unemployment, nor do they receive any checks or food from the government. People must work for their daily bread, or they do without. And these ongoing struggles only feed the increase in migration to the U.S., due to the seemingly open borders. It's truly a mess!



Many of you feel like that is true in the U.S. as well, yet I know you can imagine the further impact the pandemic, hurricanes and immigration have had on the already broken system here in Honduras. As Phil has already expressed, we are so thankful to those of you who participated in the matching challenge fund as well as those of you who are ongoing supporters. God is known for showing himself powerful amid the mess, so we ask that you join us in prayer as we attempt to build something lasting in spite of the situation.
